PROTECTION OF VIEWS - May 2017

PURPOSE

The report documents the views into and out of Little Milton with accompanying illustrations, photos and text to show how these local views, which are all publicly accessible, make the place special. This assessment will be shared with residents for their feedback before being finalised as a key part of the evidence base for Little Milton's Neighbourhood Development Plan. The information in this report is intended to provide the evidence to inform future planning decisions.

INTRODUCTION

Any development must maintain the local character of the landscape and not cause unacceptable loss or diminution of significant views that currently provide open aspects or views both within and outside the village. Except where views are entirely localised, all development proposals must be accompanied by a Landscape and Visual Impact Assessment and must demonstrate low or negligible impact on landscape views.

Certain specific views in the parish are of special significance to the local community. These include:

- views looking into the village from outside
- views of iconic landmarks from points either in the village or from footpaths within the parish

The viewpoints for all the views designated in this assessment are accessible to the public.

METHOD

This report was prepared by the NDP Steering Group and shared with the community at open events in April 2017 for their feedback. Whilst not nearly so extensive in scope, this report uses similar methodology to that used in the *London Views Management Framework: Supplementary Planning Guidance March 2012*¹ and also Natural England's *An Approach to Landscape Character Assessment.*

All the views are shown from specific viewpoints which are defined by their Latitude and Longitude and also Ordnance Survey grid reference. The viewpoint is then shown on a map and the important view is delineated by a field of view defined on the map. Where applicable, the field of view is drawn only as far as the parish boundary, marked in blue, as this assessment cannot define protected fields of view which lie outside the neighbourhood plan area ie. the parish boundary.

Photographs of the important views are also shown. Unless otherwise indicated on the photograph, the horizontal limits of the protected view are represented by the borders of the photograph.








